SEPTEMBER WORK SESSIONS MOVE THE NEEDLE

FEBT volunteers made great progress on multiple restoration projects in September, with a work weekend on the 4th and the 5th, and a work week from the 20th to the 24th. Numerous projects saw some attention and had progress made on them.

Storehouse – The new storehouse concrete floor was poured in late August, after prep work was completed by FEBT volunteers. During the September work sessions, all of the deteriorated exterior siding was replaced. In the interior, a rotted second floor beam was replaced and the south bin bank was leveled and the lower bins rebuilt. The stairway to the second floor was rebuilt, including reinstalling the adjacent column and bins, and replacing deteriorated stairway stringers, treads, and risers.

Carpentry Shop – Exterior battens were installed on the previously installed new siding, and exterior priming and painting was completed. During the work week, reconstruction of the lean-to adjacent to the south wall was begun with the outside posts being set in place.

Track work – FEBT volunteers and EBTF employees completed tie replacement between Rockhill Furnace and Colgate Grove on Sept. 14, with a "golden spike" ceremony held on Sept. 16. Track work continued during the work week with joint bolt tightening and replacements. Ballast work will continue before the remaining tourist era main line to Colgate Grove will be returned to operation, but the FEBT members who have spent countless days participating in this process have made a significant contribution to the return of the East Broad Top. The railroad estimates that 10,000 ties have been replaced by the collaboration of both entities.





Trackwork will continue with some bolt replacement where needed, which the FEBT track crew has been steadily contributing to during each recent work session. Ballast work will then be accomplished during the week, and then the line will be tamped and leveled using the East Broad Top's new tamper, which was announced as being available the day before the Golden Spike ceremony. – Dave Bulman

ROBERTSDALE HAS NEW DEPOT ROOF, REUNION EVENTS

September has been all about the new roof on the station. FEBT volunteers, led by Bill Reynolds, replaced and painted the fascia and coving. Once Ike Covert got the material for the roof, he worked very quickly. Uh oh, he was one sheet short. No problem, it gave us an opportunity to take some interesting photos. The additional metal was delivered and installed in good time. He found that the rafters and other interior supports were in amazingly good shape; no worries there. FEBT volunteers will replace the soffits next year, if not sooner.

Other projects included:

- More brush cutting, including a tree that fell smack-dab on top of the FEBT-restored switch stand (thankfully, no damage).
- The museum's entrance door swelled during the summer, so it had to be planed and painted. I thought we were done with these doors!
- The freight doors on the station were modified to well, work. Also adjusted so they create an opening large enough for the handcar to fit through. This work should be done by the time of the reunion.
- A volunteer named Victor Booth created a ramp from steel pipes which will allow us to more easily move the handcar out of the freight section, over the new scale track, and onto the main line.
 This is not yet in place, but we hope it will be ready for the reunion.
- Bill Adams made some improvements to the museum display panels.
- The gift shop has a new supply of hats, shirts, and books in stock and ready for purchase.



We are thrilled that Robertsdale will be the site of the FEBT reunion on Friday, Oct 8th and Sunday, Oct 10th! So thrilled, that we gave our volunteer hosts Saturday off. Registration will be at the Robertsdale Wood Broad Top Fire Hall, as noted in the reunion flyer. What was not in the flyer, however, is that we believe (but do not guarantee) that a vintage EBT vehicle will be parked at the station on Friday. It would be great to take photos of this without modern cars in the way. To that end, please park at the fire hall and then walk or catch a ride down to the museum (open from 10 AM to 5 PM). Catch

On Friday, the Broad Top Area Coal Miners Museum will be open especially for FEBT members (it will be open on Saturday and Sunday to the general public too). Please patronize it! It is located in the former church you can see from the station (105 Church St). Allow plenty of time to tour it; there is a ton of interesting stuff there!

Our reunion weekend is also the weekend of the Coal Miners Heritage and Robertsdale Community Days (Sat and Sun only). This means that on Sunday, there will be other things to do, see, and EAT in Robertsdale. There will be several food vendors, probably near the ball field across from the fire hall. We will have the traditional donuts and coffee at the FEBT museum in the morning, of course. Because of this community event, on Sunday, please park across the street at the current post office (former RI&C Company office building) on the grass or its gravel lot, in the gravel lot between the museum and the station, or along Railroad Street. Do not park on Main Street!

To summarize the parking situation:

- Friday 10/8/21: park at the RWBT Fire Hall and then walk or catch a shuttle to and from the museum
- Sunday 10/10/21: park at the current post office, the museum, or along Railroad St.




An interesting view of the new and old roof panels on the Robertsdale Station building during the roof replacement process. – Jane Clarke photo

STORE WEBSITE CHECKOUT IMPROVEMENT

If you have used the company store website to sign up for the Reunion, then you may have noticed a change. Dave Phillips, a volunteer like ALL of us who work for FEBT, has found a way to overcome something that had become our members favorite thing to hate. Now when you make a purchase from the company store, and that includes renewing your membership and purchasing your reunion package, you don't have to go through PayPal. You simply enter your credit card info directly on a company store screen, which is then sent securely to the credit card processing company. So, you never have to work your way through the PayPal screens (over which we have no control, and which encourage you to create a PayPal account). See the screen shot to the right.

As you can see, to pay with your credit card you just enter the info. Just like you do when ordering on other online shopping sites, (credit card number, security code, expiration date). This data is not saved nor stored by the FEBT website, shopping on the FEBT website is safe and secure. All standard industry safeguards are followed. Note that you can still select to pay by PayPal and once there, you could still select to pay using your credit card. But why bother when you can do it without the aggravation of dealing with the



PayPal screens? Well, one reason to still use the PayPal option is that PayPal charges a little less for credit card processing. So, if you are comfortable navigating the PayPal site, go on and use it. That keeps just a little bit more money for FEBT.
