## FEBT, EBT FOUNDATION RECEIVE WRINN AWARD

Friends of the East Broad Top and the EBT Foundation were jointly awarded the first-ever Jim Wrinn Award for the biggest railway preservation story of 2022. The Wrinn Award is presented by the HeritageRail Alliance, and is named for the former Trains magazine editor. Cate Kratville-Wrinn presented FEBT President Andy Van Scyoc the award, who received it on behalf of both the FEBT and EBTF in Windsor Locks, CT on September 10<sup>th</sup>. ## SOUTHBOUND FROM THE SOUTHERN TERMINUS

"Cornstalks and beanpoles" once described a bridge reconstruction project. The utterance was from Abraham Lincoln. It described the work of Herman Haupt, in charge of U.S. military railroads at the start of the Civil War.

Gene Tucker's army didn't have a 400 footlong span to reconstruct. They also didn't have hundreds of soldiers and unlimited supplies. Yet, in one day, his group of volunteers was able create a bridge over a large washout, extending handcar and speeder rides south from Robertsdale to a quarter of a mile from the village of Wood.



Tucker's track volunteers were numerous enough to divide into two crews. One crew on the bridge project, while the other crew worked at correcting the track gauging along the main line. Gauges as narrow as 29 inches were found and corrected using hook bars, steel ties, and wooden ties. Relics of some of the original ties with spikes still attached were occasionally

discovered. They were usually found while pickaxing tree roots and stumps too close to the inside rails for handcar clearances.

The physical work of the warm summer day was only made more challenging by the remoteness of the worksite. Tools and supplies had to be transported to the Broad Top Mountain location using the FEBT handcar and Steve Jackson's Gator.

Work continued in Rockhill on Boxcar 174 over the weekend of September 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>. Several volunteers worked to make repairs to the decayed steel of the car. Steel work was fabricated and installed to continue the effort to get the car stabilized and enclosed. The watchman's shanty kit is primarily laser-cut basswood. Like the prototype, it has a built-in desk and benches inside. The doors and windows can be made closed or open if you want to detail the inside with a pot-belly stove and chair. The side portion was the coal bin.

## FALL WORK WEEK MAKES PROGRESS IN ROCKHILL

The FEBT Fall Work Week was held in Rockhill Furnace, PA from Monday, September 19<sup>th</sup> through Friday, September 23<sup>rd</sup>. The week saw a lot of progress on several projects, as well as some team-building and camaraderie opportunities. Much work was completed around the Rockhill Shops Complex, on Combine 14, and on reconstructing the Coal Dock Filling Shed.



Many work sessions this summer have seen the Carpentry Crew shoring up portions of the Shops Complex and replacing rotted cladding on a number of structures. The Carpentry Crew's focus of the work week was on another matter, so it allowed for painting of the work they had accomplished earlier in the year. The Carpentry Shop's new windows had their trim painted white, as well as three windows of the Roundhouse. The sides of the Storehouse, the Sandhouse, the rebuilt portions of south end of the Car Shop, and the north end of the Lumber Shed received the traditional red paint throughout the week to protect the wood. Another project in the Rockhill Yard was some added fencing along the wye track, adjacent to the area of the property occupied by the Rockhill Trolley Museum (RTM).

Combine 14 also received some paint. This paint was not the white and red of the shops structures, but the shade of green of the passenger rolling stock fleet. Members painted the window sashes and exterior siding of the car. The pieces were laid to dry on the drying racks created this summer for just such an application, and will be installed at future work sessions over the fall and winter. The seat frames for the car were given a coat of primer as well.

A focal point of the 2022 Fundraising Campaign was for funds to help reconstruct the Coal Dock at the south end of the Rockhill Yard. The required sequence of events and material procurement finally allowed FEBT members an opportunity to help with this project as the campaign is coming to a close. After the EBT Foundation installed new FEBT-funded steel beams to support the rails of the loading track late this summer, FEBT's chance had finally come. The Carpentry Crew assembled and erected the walls for the Filling Shed that used to sit atop the Coal Dock but had been lost to time. By week's end, the Filling Shed stood tall with both east and west walls as well as roof framing completed. Metal roofing and wooden side boards will be installed during future work sessions.



FEBT Work Weeks aren't all about work. Attendees enjoy a number of fun activities as well, as the opportunities present themselves. The work party enjoyed lunches together each day at the RTM Pavilion, with the food provided by FEBT. On Tuesday, each attendee received the new FEBT Volunteer tee shirt as a "Thank You" for their contributions. Wednesday evening saw a get-together hosted at the nearby home of FEBT volunteer and EBT Foundation employee Andrew Greene. There was a dinner outing to a restaurant in Huntingdon one evening. If you stayed around Friday night or into the weekend, the EBT was hosting the Central Pennsylvania Ragtime & American Music Festival.

## SEPTEMBER ROBERTSDALE ROUNDUP

September 17 was another Archives Day and archivist Julie Rockwell did not disappoint. She brought maps from the earliest days that showed Mine No. 1 before the long trestle was built (did you know that the mine car track weaved around and came at the EBT track at 90 degrees? We saw the first map I've ever seen that seemed to show the oftmentioned (but never seen by me) turntable on the engine house lead track. That map also showed Mine No. 3, so the map predates Mine No. 5. It also showed Mine No. 2. Now, finally, I've seen something that tells how they got the coal from Mine No. 2 (which was on the other side of Great Trough Creek and not directly rail-served) to the EBT. She had a map that showed the route and the design of the trestle system that allowed mine cars to be moved from Mine No. 2 to the Mine No. 3 tipple!

Evidently, a ticket was not a valid ticket unless it was stamped with issuing station and date. I hear plans that might get the engine house lead track back in service, maybe by the Reunion. On Friday of the Reunion weekend, we expect to have a speeder in Robertsdale. So, you can see it without sweating!

Speaking of heat, not to worry if Reunion weekend ends up a hot one. We expect that the new A/C units will be completely functional by then.

The regular walking tour path is now about the same as most state park hiking trails. Easy to follow and no bushes or weeds to push through.



This year the museum is open every Saturday that the railroad runs trains. Rather than mark the end of the season, the Reunion marks the start of the best season. Leaves fall, so more interesting sites become visible. Humidity and temperatures drop so the walk or handcar ride are much more comfortable. ## "THAT WAS THE MONTH THAT WAS" FOR THE TRACK GANG



FEBT's track personnel stretched their wings (working in a variety of locations) and their talents (things like fence construction) during the month of September.

We began the month in Robertsdale on Saturday, the 3<sup>rd</sup>, which was our contribution to the Work Weekend, constructing a small bridge over a twenty-foot-long washout, and extending the track that's open for handcar/speeder use southward to a point about 5,800 feet south of the museum. (See related article elsewhere in this issue.)

Then, during the week of September 12<sup>th</sup>, we finished spiking up the first round of track rebuilding on the main leading south from the Rockhill yard, reaching the north side of the PA 475 crossing. The completed work now extends about 8/10 mile south of the yard. Along the way following that work, we picked up a good deal of steel ties, tie plates and other ferrous material. We assisted preparations for the FEBT Reunion by moving speeders around in the Car Shed so they could be worked on.

We were quite active during the Work Week, September  $19^{th} - 23^{rd}$ , as we tried our hand at fence construction, finishing the split rail fence along the north leg of the wye

in the Rockhill yard. Next, we began bolt work in the newly rebuilt track leading south from the yard. Then, finally, we applied some more touches to the new bridge in Robertsdale. We also opened up another 200 feet of track for handcar/speeder use there.

A goodly number of our personnel were active during the month, including: Rick Rourke, Joel Myers, Gordon Ley, Kevin Conklin, Ed Kompare, Bill Reynolds, Tom Perman, Chris Wenger, Steve Jackson, John Quinn, Mark Reese, Daniel Lane, and Mike Shay (a new member of the crew). (Sure hope this is a complete list!) During the month, we were greatly assisted by Steve Jackson, who brought his Gator for transporting materials and tools to the Robertsdale work sites, and by Nicholas Brightbill, who assisted the fence project in Rockhill with the operation of machinery to lessen the task of creating post holes.

Like so many FEBT volunteers, some of the names you read above came for more than one day's work last month, and some came a long distance to be present. We are eternally grateful for that sort of dedication! – *Gene Tucker*
