FEBT NOVEMBER ROCKHILL WORK SESSION SUMMARY

We had a very successful November work weekend in Rockhill on November 4 and 5. The weather cooperated and we had a good turnout with 29 volunteers on Saturday and 15 on Sunday. Good progress was made on multiple projects.

Combine 14 moved forward on multiple fronts, including paint prep on the baggage compartment ceiling and platform step painting.

The Boxcar 174 crew continued milling new oak boards for the floor.

The Storehouse crew restocked the large lean-to bin, installed the lean-to back window and exterior trim, and painted the window trim on the Storehouse west side.





In the Car Shop, the team installed the new wood floor at the north end of the building.

The window crew continued repairing and reinstalling window sashes, including several in the Roundhouse.

Finally, the track crew continued restoring track south of the Oddfellows Cemetery Rd crossing, installing 120 additional ties. Read more in the article on Page 8.



ARCHIVES PROGRAM RECEIVES NEH GRANT

This August, the National Endowment of the Humanities (NEH) Division of Preservation and Access awarded the EBT Foundation a \$10,000 Preservation Assistance Grant for Smaller Institutions supporting the East Broad Top Railroad Archives and Special Collections. A collaboration between the Foundation and the Friends of the East Broad Top, the grant funds an 18-month Disaster Response Planning and Environmental Monitoring Project, which provides emergency response planning and training for cultural heritage institutions and first responders along the EBT's historic right-of-way.

In addition to the East Broad Top Railroad Archives and Special Collections, the participating cultural heritage organizations include the Mount Union Historical Society, Bricktown Model Railroaders Association, Fort Shirley Heritage Association, Orbisonia-Rockhill Furnace Historical Society, Three Springs-Saltillo Area Historical Society, and first responders from Mount Union, Orby-Rockhill, Three Springs, and Robertsdale-Wood Fire Departments.

Each participating cultural heritage institution has East Broad Top-related archival materials not duplicated within the holdings of the railroad or the Friends of the East Broad Top, and unique and valuable collections representing their communities. The goal is to create a comprehensive, inclusive, community-wide cultural heritage emergency response program.

Funding also helps the Archives establish an environmental monitoring program to protect the archival collections of the East Broad Top Railroad. To initiate the environmental monitoring program, the project team will install data loggers for the Orbisonia Station and the FEBT Robertsdale Museum in December. The team, then, will be ready to analyze and report data captures by the end of the year.

EBT Archivist Julie Rockwell serves as the grant project director, leading the FEBT-EBTF support team. The team comprises Scarlett Wirt, Lee Rainey, Brad Esposito, James Roslund, and Archives Technician Sammy Bellin.

In November, Rockwell visited board meetings of five of the organizations to introduce members to the project and will see two more in December. In January, the support team will visit area first responders to familiarize them with the grant and upcoming training and collaboration opportunities.

The Conservation Center for Art and Historic Artifacts, Philadelphia, Pa., will conduct a two-part *Disaster Recovery and Response* workshop with an online presentation and hands-on training on April 22 and May 6, 2024. The project support team will attend a two-part webinar *Writing a Disaster Plan* course in June 2024, conducted by the Northeast Document Conservation Center. The project team will then support writing a community-wide disaster plan and help the other organizations develop and write their own tailored plans. The project also aligns with the Central PA Alliance for Response, whose steering committee Rockwell is a member of, and will support regional cultural response and recovery initiatives.

These critical activities will better prepare EBTF-FEBT staff, volunteers, and first responders to protect EBT's unique collections and ensure that the approach to disaster response and recovery is a collaborative effort to protect the heritage of the Southern Huntingdon County rural areas.


While many details are still in the planning stages and are not ready to be revealed at this time, one thing that can be revealed is the dates for the 2024 FEBT Fall Reunion.

RENEWING AND RECREATING: THE TRACK GANG'S WORK THIS MONTH

27 FEBT personnel assisted in the work of the track gang this month. Part of our efforts were focused on renewing the track north of the Orbisonia Station, in the area between the north wye switch and the Blacklog Creek bridge. The other focus was on the work to recreate the track south of the IOOF Cemetery Road crossing.

It's never a bad idea to back up and address the needs of trackage that were deliberately set aside during the initial phase of track renewal between the Orbisonia Station and Colgate Grove. That's a fair description of what happened when track rebuilding got going following the EBT Foundation's purchase of the railroad in early 2020: The needs of the track immediately north of the station were set aside until other, more urgent, work could be done.

Now, however, the railroad's track forces (the EBT Foundation's fulltime staff and the FEBT's volunteers) have been able to turn their collective attention to the section of the track immediately north of the Orbisonia Station.

In this reporting period, over 70 ties were installed in the main track (Track 2) between the north wye switch and the Blacklog Creek bridge. In addition, ties were installed in the switch leading from Track 2 to Track 1 (the track closest to the station).

Raising the track significantly was part of this work. Ballasting, surfacing and tamping followed. Some alignment of the track was also applied to the track.

The adjacent Pinmill Track (Track 3), also received some surfacing, since it is now in regular use by southbound trains as they return from the Grove.

Rebuilding (and Reclaiming) Out-of-Service Track

Much of the focus, these days, is on the march southward toward Pogue, Three Springs and Saltillo. The railroad's track personnel were able to rebuild more track south of the IOOF Cemetery Road crossing this past month. During the November Work Weekend on Saturday, November 4th, fourteen FEBT personnel inserted 120 ties in the track south of the

crossing (I think that's a new, one-day record!). Spiking up of those ties followed. As a result, the basic reconstruction of the track has now progressed to a point about 660 feet south of the crossing. We are currently about 1,900 feet from the PA 475 crossing. Some ballasting took place in this area once the spiking was complete.

We've known for awhile that each joint in this area requires dismantling, cleaning, relubricating and re-assembling, if we are to avoid problems as the weather gets colder or hotter. See last month's column for a description of this phenomenon. Our approach to this process involves dismantling the rail five joints south of the previous joint that was dismantled. Then, the work train is used to pull five rail lengths northward (on average, four or five inches) so that the joints are properly situated. To make the movement easier, any schmutz that is in front of the ties that will move is removed. Then, once the track has been pulled up against the previously-serviced track, each joint in between receives the dismantling, cleaning, re-lubing and re-assembling procedure. This work has progressed about 165 feet south of the track's reconstruction, or to a point about 825 feet south of the crossing.

As part of this overall effort, we did some brush cutting and tree removal from the PA 475 crossing northward. This work will enable machinery to come in and redo two culverts in advance of our efforts to rebuild the track.

Thanks to the donations and support of so many, FEBT has been able to underwrite the purchase of much of the materials we are using. To cite but one example, during the week of November 13th, about 1,000 ties were delivered to the railroad. As a result, there's a mighty stack of ties in the Boney Pile awaiting installation in the track. The cost of this supply of ties was entirely underwritten by contributions to FEBT.


