# CALENDAR YEAR 2025 IN REVIEW – TRACK DEPARTMENT

Here is an overview of the main activities of FEBT's track personnel during 2025.

## Caring for the Infrastructure Currently in Service

Two major projects were undertaken by the combined forces of the railroad's full-time staff, assisted by FEBT volunteers, in calendar year 2025. We did a significant amount of tie replacement in the main line a bit north of the custard stand. We also began the process of upgrading Track 3 in the Rockhill Yard. The aim of this work is to allow Track 3 to be used as a passing siding. This work involved respacing of current ties in the track structure so as to obtain a twenty-two-inch spacing. Ties that required removal and replacement were also spaced accordingly. Since many of the ties didn't require removal and replacement, a good bit of this work involved moving the ties in one direction or another, so as to get them in the right spot. A good bit of work with sledge hammers applied to the sides of the ties did the trick, in most situations. (It's safe to say that, after the day's work, those who made use of those sledge hammers were able to cancel their afternoon therapy sessions.) As I write this in mid-December, this work is almost done, having reached a point about one hundred feet south of the Meadow Street grade crossing.

## Did Anyone Say “Grade Crossings”?

In 2024, we tackled the replacement of the PA Route 475 crossing. That was good practice for the work that we faced in 2025, for this year we replaced five crossings. The first to receive attention was the driveway leading into the sewer treatment plant (this plant is located nearby to George's Used Cars, on the north side of Orbisonia). The next one replaced was at Enyeart Road, a bit further north (and a little south of the custard stand).

Then, we turned our attention southward, and redid the crossing at PA Route 994, a little north of the Southern Huntingdon High School. That crossing is the longest of the five, about 78 feet long. It required welding together two sticks of rail (so as to avoid having a joint in the roadway).

Finally, the two grade crossings in front of the High School were also redone. (The completion of this work brought us within sight of the north side of the Pogue Bridge.)

The process for all five crossings was much the same: new and heavier rail, new crossties (treated with the new copper-nap treatment), well-tamped #3 ballast stone, and followed by repaving.

### Miscellaneous Work

In advance of the annual Memorial Day Weekend events in Three Springs, our personnel cleaned flangeways so as to allow for speeder and handcar rides.

We spent time in Robertsdale as well, installing two turntables so that railbikes could be turned without lifting them. We also restored the switch for the south end of the Mine 5 siding to service, allowing for vehicles to take the siding while other traffic passed. The switch at the enginehouse lead just south of the Robertsdale Museum was adjusted so it works properly.

### Looking Ahead and Preparing for 2026

Much clearing of the right-of-way in Saltillo took place this year. The same can be said for the ROW south of Pogue Station (a project undertaken and supported by FEBT). Work in these two locations will allow for construction of track once the various aspects of the work fall into place.

Track materials (ties, spikes, bolts, joint bars, etc.) were distributed in Saltillo, working north from the rebuilt, new station.

FEBT authorized the purchase of 2,400 relay crossties. Shipment of these ties began in early December. FEBT personnel assisted the full-time employees in resizing these ties (down to six-foot length for ties to be used in yard service, and to seven-foot length for mainline service).

**And Finally, a Tribute to our Wonderful Workers!**  
How many operations that are similar to EBT's across the country can say that they have a generous supply of eager and capable track workers? Probably not many, I'll wager. We are blessed, tremendously so, by the dedication, skill, willingness to assist whenever and however it's required, and humor of our FEBT crew. They are numerous. They are eager to advance the cause of the EBT's betterment. And, they work wonderfully well right alongside the railroad's two first-class employees; Track Foreman Henry Long and new employee Zane Esposito. We look forward to an exciting and productive new year. – *Gene Tucker*

# 2025 RESTORATION ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2025 was truly an amazing year for FEBT restoration efforts. Thanks to our dedicated volunteers, our generous donors, and the support of the EBTF, we've made incredible progress to preserve, restore, and interpret the East Board Top this year. Our volunteers dedicated over 18,000 hours of their time in the past year, and our donors contributed more than \$550,000. Here are highlights of all the progress this year.

## The March to Saltillo

The March to Saltillo restored over 5,400 feet of track to service, all the way to the north approach of the Pogue bridge at the Southern Huntingdon County High School. This included the rebuilding of the grade crossings at Route 994 and the two high school driveways. What a thrill it was to ride to within sight of the Pogue bridge at the reunion! Track work at Saltillo was started, with approximately a mile of ROW north from the station cleared and graded. Ties and other track materials were purchased and then laid out on the ROW for track assembly that will begin soon.



Work is also underway south of the Pogue Bridge. Clearing and grading of the stretch from Pogue siding to Price's bridge that was very overgrown and included a large washout is nearing completion by G&H Anderson Excavating. This work required heavy equipment access and needed to be completed before track assembly could start at Pogue. This work will allow track construction to proceed south from Pogue in 2026. To prepare for this effort, 2,400 additional ties were ordered in December using 2026 Campaign funds and are now being delivered.

## Track Work

The combined FEBT and EBTF track crew were also busy beyond the March to Saltillo. They replaced two crossings on the mainline north of Rockhill this year and rebuilt the Rockhill yard Track 3 with extensive tie replacements allowing its return to full service. ## Saltillo Station

Saltillo Station went from plans to reality this year! After groundbreaking on April 5, construction by J.L. Swope Construction progressed rapidly. The exterior of the station is now complete, and installation of the plumbing, electrical and HVAC systems is underway. Plans for completion of the interior by FEBT volunteers is moving forward, and custom interior siding to replicate the original materials is on order from a local lumber mill. The interior will include reinstallation of multiple original elements including the ticket window.



## Rockhill Structures

The Rockhill Furnace Shops Complex saw continued major progress to restore and preserve the historic buildings and structures. This year five new metal roofs were installed, including on the Freight Office and the Foundry gantry. This continues our multi-year effort to ensure that all of the Rockhill buildings have sound roofs.

The Rockhill turntable was completely rebuilt with new timbers and decking.

Restoration of Storehouse 2 also made great progress. The first-floor stock racks were emptied during the May work week, and the building was raised and supported on cribbing by Earl Miller & Sons building movers. The first-floor structure was then removed, and a new full foundation installed. FEBT volunteers and EBTF staff then rebuilt the first-floor framing, allowing the cribbing to be removed. Next up will be rebuilding the stock racks and installing new historically correct wood siding.

The Rockhill window crew continued restoring and installing windows throughout the shop complex. A major focus was all of the windows in the alleyway between the machine and boiler shops. By the end of the year, all of the windows and trim had been restored. Siding replacement and painting also continued in the alleyway, and on the south wall of the boiler shop.

Finally, a new effort was launched this year to restore the interior of the Blacksmith Shop, led by our Next Gen Easties volunteers. Restoration work included the belt-driven hammer forge, the large drop forge, anvil supports, coal bins, work-tables, tool racks, and one of the forges. Most recently the team emptied the large stock rack in preparation for its rebuilding.

Great progress was also made on the equipment front. Combine 14 neared final completion with the installation of windows, doors, lights, seat frame, steps and myriad other parts. The car was set on shop trucks and rolled outside at the conclusion of the September work week. The EBTF mechanical team began rebuilding the trucks, and the required new truck components were purchased, included brasses, wedges, and wheelsets. In 2026, the car will be turned over to the EBTF mechanical team for completion of brake and truck work.

Boxcar 174 also neared completion in 2025, with flooring and interior sheathing completed and work benches, toolboxes, and interior lighting installed to enable its new role as a mobile workshop. Painting of the exterior was begun and will be completed as soon as the weather allows.

The two unpainted hopper cars in Robertsdale were painted black by our Young Easties, and the cars stenciled with EBT heralds and markings.

The FEBT campaign is also supporting the restoration of steam locomotive No. 15 including the purchase of a new tender tank. In 2025 the old tender tank was shipped to Curry Supply Co. for use as template, and construction of the new tank is now underway. The 2025 Campaign provided funding for the trailing truck, and the 2026 Campaign will provide funds for new staybolts.



The East Broad Top Railroad Archives and Special Collections team had another busy year preserving and making accessible EBT historical materials. A total of 561 catalog records from 13 distinct collections were made available this year. This included six EBT Directors' and Stockholders' Minutes volumes (including Shade Gap RR and Rocky Ridge RR volumes) comprising 1,197 scanned pages. In addition, the Archives received grant awards from the PHMC & NRHS, employed two Juniata College interns, and had over 425 volunteer hours contributed. Most recently in December, the EBT Archives released the second of the collections of rolling stock data generated by the EBT in response to the requirements of the Interstate Commerce Commission:

EBTF.2023.22.5 contains the handwritten volume Mechanical Field Notes of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Bureau of Valuation (96 pp.) for EBT locomotives, cars, small shop tools, and a variety of shop infrastructure.

# A PRODUCTIVE 2025 IN ROBERTSDALE

I've been encouraged to make this month's article be a "year in review". So, let's look at 2025.

People were on site at the museum on at least 75 days this year.

- 35 of those were days that the museum was open.
- 40 of those were days the museum was closed, but people were there working on one thing or another.

Not in Robertsdale, but the Museum host crew also handled the railbike rides on the 4th of July event in Rockhill Furnace, so we'll take credit for that and get to 76 days.

In those 35 days we welcomed 719 guests. Add the at least 65 people who took a railbike ride on the 4th and the museum crew helped expose at least 784 people to FEBT.

I hear you saying, "Pete, the reunion skews all your numbers." Ok, let's not count the reunion days (two) or signed-in attendance (161). That gets us to 33 days and 558 guests. That means we averaged nearly 17 guests each day that the museum was open. It was our second-largest year for attendance. Second only to 2023 when we had a large group that brought 181 visitors. Remove that group and we are at a virtual tie.

Those visitors were generous with their donations and purchased many items from the gift shop. I'm pretty sure that a high percentage of "them" was you. Thank you for supporting the museum.

Who were hosts in 2025? Roy Burnham, Ed DeMott, Lance Gilliland, Charlie High, Steve Jackson, Greg Kifer, Doug Linebaugh, Bill Mosteller, Kevin Nolish, Hans Plugge, Rickie Rourke, Aaron Stilson, Chris Walker, Rob Willhite, Scarlett Wirt, and me. Archivist Julie Fether and the "Archives Days" that she organized helped a lot as well. By the way, if you don't think that your strong suit is rebuilding railroad cars or jacking up buildings or rebuilding track then the kind of work the hosts do might be more up your alley.

Nice numbers, but what else happened?

- The HVAC in the old post office was repaired.
- We built new, more efficient shelves in the inventory closet.
- We painted and fixed up the glass exhibit cases.
- We painted the picture rail in the Inman Hall to make it fade from view.
- Roy repaired and improved the railbikes (several times).
- We purchased, built, and installed 2 cabinets on the 2nd floor to help organize donated items.
- Victor Booth built 2 turntables for the railbikes. Then he and a crew installed them.
- Scarlett designed and installed new displays in the Inman Hall two times.
- When the local organizers of the Robertsdale Community and Heritage Days event threw in the towel, Jane stepped up and with help from the Miners Museum, the fire department, and the EBT (speeders), to create Robertsdale-Wood Heritage Day.

- We continued to work with Julie Fether and had several “Archives Days,” some of which included greater cooperation with the Miners Museum.
- We opened for the Keystone Trails group.
- We opened for “Trolleyfest” which was held at the Rockhill Trolley Museum.
- We opened for the Mid-Hudson On30 Modelers, organized by Dave Camisa.
- We opened for the Huntingdon County Visitors Bureau (and as a result got this great on-line tour made by Hanah Thatcher – find the “Virtual Museum Tour at <https://febtx.org/robertsdale-museum/>.
- Gene Tucker and the track crew extended the usable track, and later in the year added another functional switch (so we can have rail vehicles “pass” at the mid-point).
- We added new items in the gift shop.
- We actually got started replacing the station doors – one new door is hung.
- The last two hopper cars were painted by the Young Easties and lettered.
- The final large display panel in the Inman Hall was finished. (Thanks to Bill Adams for that incredibly long job. He designed and began building them in 2010.)
- A librarian stepped down (thanks for your work, Don Barton Jr.) and another stepped in (Kevin Nolish). Kevin, Scarlett, and other folks in FEBT are re-imagining what a library means these days – and how to get there.
- A time bomb that had existed for many years went off – we had a sewer back-up during the Reunion. We hired a plumber who got it fixed. Ok, it took 2.
- We purchased a new radio base station with an external antenna to work with 6 handheld radios loaned to us by the railroad. We now have radio coverage over the entire length of railbike and walking tours. Should an emergency happen, we can now get help quickly.
- FEBT purchased a mine car that worked in the mines served by the EBT. It needs restoration work, but it’s on display in Robertsdale now.
- For our year-end celebration, museum hosts were allowed to ride our railbikes on the mainline from to Rockhill Furnace north and south! We then shared a relaxing cook out/pot luck dinner.



# JANUARY ARCHIVES RELEASE

The East Broad Top Railroad Archives and Special Collections kicks off 2026 by releasing a treasure trove of information scanned from selected volumes of the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) Annual Reports.

In recent months we have showcased the EBT's yearly submissions to the federal government's Interstate Commerce Commission relative to rolling stock. This is a rich source for historians and modelers. But many rail historians argue that one of the greatest accomplishments of the ICC was the systemization and annual collection of a wealth of passenger and freight traffic data. This allows comparisons through time, across railroads, and much more.

Let's take an EBT example. Curious about how much iron ore the EBT carried in 1905? The ICC files have it: 43,442 tons. How much of that was originated on the EBT? None, says the ICC report. That ore was worked into 25,176 tons of manufactured pig and bloom originating on the EBT. (By the way, if you are growing tired of hard numbers, by contrast, that year farmers along the EBT originated and shipped only four tons of wool – just a bit more than the proverbial “three bags full.”)

# EBT ARCHIVES SAYS FAREWELL TO SAMMY BELLIN, HELLO TO AMELIA KASDORF

In December 2025, the EBT Foundation and FEBT said a heartfelt “Farewell” to Sammy Bellin, the EBT Archives’ inaugural Juniata College intern and later the first Archives Technician. Sammy had been a key player since the establishment of the East Broad Top Archives and Special Collections in May 2021.

As the first Juniata College intern, working alongside me, Sammy entered the world of the EBT while he was a junior in the history department at the college. In fall 2020, Charles R. and Shirley A. Knox Professor of History Dr. Jim Tuten and FEBT board member Lawrence Biemiller led an introductory local history course focused on EBT history. Students in the class wrote *A Brief Guide to the EBT: Living Relic of the Industrial Age*, of which Sammy was lead author. Tuten and Biemiller recommended Sammy to be the first intern to assist me, as I had wanted to start an internship program in partnership with the Archives.

Starting on May 27, 2021, Sammy and I began the mammoth task of conducting a spot inventory of the EBT corporate records; an estimated 5,000+ linear feet of documents, maps and drawings, ledgers, photographs, and correspondence retained in the Orbisonia Passenger Depot vaults, administrative and engineering offices, and various buildings at the historic industrial complex. Sammy and I began building the archive from scratch.

After graduating in May 2022 with a Bachelor’s degree in history, Sammy became the Archives Technician to assist in the processing, preservation, digitization, and cataloging of EBTF and FEBT collections. With the chief engineer’s office secured for Archives operations and a technical infrastructure (computers, an Epson scanner, and the collections management software) in place, Sammy took the lead and started scanning the most accessible, manageable, and eye-catching of the collections, such as the Friends’ Jack Alexander Collection (FEBT.2022.2) and the Foundation’s first collection of donated train orders (EBTF.2022.1). Our goal was to have 1000 catalog records available for the launch of the publicly accessible Digital Catalog at the FEBT Annual Reunion in October 2022. Sammy met that goal, and he certainly didn’t stop there!

Sammy learned how to wrangle the wide-format scanner and the small book scanner, and how to scan and fine-tune hundreds of

photographs, slides, and negatives using the Epson scanner and Photoshop Elements. The longest drawing Sammy scanned (with help from two others) has probably been 10 feet.

Since 2022, Sammy has done an incredible job scanning and cataloging literally thousands of documents and photos for at least 140 collections, most of which are available for public access. Currently, 4,983 catalog records contain 14,441 individual digital images. Sammy's work included physically processing collections, completing requests for EBTF and FEBT internal operations, training interns and volunteers, developing and documenting workflows, participating in educational and community outreach, and assisting me with all things Archives.

Sammy worked closely with EBT curator/historian Lee Rainey, and other EBT historians Ron Pearson, Ric Case, Vagel Keller, Dave Johnson, Rich Wickett, and Lawrence Biemiller, as well as the Foundation's Brad Esposito, James Roslund, Linn Moedinger, Dave Domitrovich, and Ron Freitag. Many of the cataloged and scanned records shared on social media, featured in FEBT's *Timber Transfer*, and in the monthly newsletter were created by Sammy throughout his tenure.





After all these years of accomplishments, Sammy is heading in a new direction. However, the legacy contributions of Sammy's to the EBT Archives are the training, professional leadership, and skill sets he's passed down to our new Archives Technician, Amelia Kasdorf.

Amelia, the EBT Archives' fall intern, graduated from Juniata College in May 2025 with degrees in museum studies, history, and environmental science. Since August, Sammy has worked closely with Amelia to introduce her to all facets of the Archives operations. Amelia also worked with Lee Rainey to execute a "Car Capacity Tariffs Project," which was featured in FEBT's November 2025 Newsletter and is available in the digital catalog (EBTF.2023.3). Another tariffs project will be featured publicly this winter.


